By posting your video podcast or video blog on the iTunes store, you'll make it available to millions of potential viewers. It's easy to post your videos on iTunes and reach a large audience with your video podcast. There are many video sharing websites that will publish your videos directly to the iTunes store. The easiest way is to upload your video to a blip.tv, which will automatically send all your work to iTunes. If you want to do it yourself, you first have to create a video blog. This is the site you will use to post your videos online. Next, set up an account with feedburner to syndicate your video blog. Feedburner adds a feature to your video blog that automatically alerts customers when you post new content. Once you've set up your FeedBurner account, you're ready to submit your video blog to iTunes. In the podcasts section of the iTunes store, select Send Podcasts, which will take you through the process of getting your videos listed in the iTunes store. Once your video is listed in the iTunes store, anyone interested can subscribe and download new videos automatically every time you post them. If you've worked hard to create some original content and you want to sell it through iTunes, you're in luck. iTunes received motion pictures and long documentaries of original features that were originally released either in theaters or directly to video. Most of the independent films to be found on iTunes are delivered by one of Apple's aggregator partners. This old movie clip was recently remastered using artificial intelligence (AI), and the results look like high definition video. The artist behind this transformation gave Live Science readers a first look at the stunning results. Although still black and white, the remastered footage no longer appears agitated and streaking, as silent films usually do. Movement in very old movies looks very fast because the hand crank film camera of the day captures fewer frames per second (fps) than the camera does now. Digital artist Matt Loughrey, who restored the historic photographs in My Colorful Past, developed a process that brought film clips from the late 19th and early 20th centuries to the present. Loughrey uses AI to recreate missing visual information between the original frames in these films. By allowing the movement to advance as smoothly as it happens in contemporary movies and videos, Loughrey's remastered footage looks very modern, even when it was shot more than 100 years ago. William Buffalo Bill Cody, american showman, Pony Express rider and creator of the popular Wild West show, conferred with Oglala Lakota leader Sísé Mázá, also known as Chief Iron Tail, in plains Indian Sign Language. The original footage of their conversation was recorded at about 19 fps, as is common for movies during that time; to put that into perspective, the frame rate for modern movies is 24 fps, and high definition video (HD) is 60 fps. Higher fps levels are one of the reasons why details in HD video look so sharp, especially when compared to films from the silent era. Loughrey told Live Science. To create a modern effect in buffalo bill clips and movies even older, Loughrey devised an algorithm that produced a new frame between the film's original frames. However, this differs from movement interpolation, another video processing technique, which simply duplicates and combines existing frames, he said. What you get at the end is, in feel, optical illusion, because many of those frames never existed, explained Loughrey. It fills the void with the best guesses. The algorithm processed about a minute of buffalo bill footage in about 40 hours, generating thousands of new frames. In the final screening, with footage playing at about 60 fps, the people in the film move in what appears to be real time - unlike the accelerated jerky movements in the original movie clip. You can see Cody's pocket watch moving. You could see her hair moving, Loughrey said. Even though you knew physics was the same then as it is now, when you see that physics is the same, it's like visual vertigo. Loughrey created the same baffling effect in a remastered Broadway clip in New York City that was filmed in 1896 at 16 fps. In the remastered clip, which plays at 71 fps, people cross the street, clamber at construction sites and stroll on sidewalks, despite the architecture, vehicles, and clothing of the 19th century, the way people move highlights the small details that make the scene look as soon as possible as if shot on this day. It's like some version of time travel, Loughrey said. There are all these little stories going on, you just won't catch that at 16 frames per second.
